Rip Smith Presents Luminar

- Rip did a presentation on Luminar. He said that Adobe had Photoshop Elements, which was good for someone just starting out and the cost was not very high. This was a great program for beginners. Now that Photoshop and all its products have gone to a subscription, having the full-blown Photoshop may be overkill for some folks. Luminar can be used as a standalone or can be used in conjunction with Lightroom. What is missing is the Image Management Program.
- Rip recommends that your photos should be kept on an external drive so in case your computer crashes, you still have your photos.
- Couple of points to address about Luminar: It doesn't process as fast as other programs; it does have presets (if you like to use those); it likes working from RAW files; it gives you workspace options like the filters, essentials and RAW development.

- The one area that works very well is the Accent AI Filter – it uses contrast/clarity and you can work on different parts of your photo instead the entire photo. This means that you can bring up the contract/clarity on different areas of your pictures.
- Raw files will give you more room for adjustment.
- Luminar typically runs under \$100.
